In Honor of Service to Our Country

The requirement to register with Selective Service was reinstated in 1980, but only for men born January 1, 1960, or later.

Well, that was me. I remember the day I went down to my local post office, filled out the form, took it to the counter and turned it in. Even though there wasn't a war then, I felt I needed to be willing to do my part for my country, if needed.

I come from a family of men who fought in WWII. Pictured here on the left is my father, Leslie. He was a sergeant

car shows like the Harrah's Collection in Reno in the 70s, camping trips to the Sierras and eating a lot of good food in Frisco, where they lived their whole lives.

Like many who served in the military back then, my uncle and father were not open to sharing stories from the war, and I never asked. But one night near the end of his life, my Uncle Al began to share some of his stories: about being shot at while piloting his B17 over Borneo and about having to ditch his aircraft on takeoff. He said to me, "I don't know why I'm telling

cently, from Ukraine, making us wonder: How can this be happening in the 21st Century?

On Saturday, April 30, a group of us participated in a car show on Naval Base Coronado that was part of an overall event for its military families. It was a very unique show where not only classic cars were on display, but also military trucks—very BIG trucks. These included a dump truck that could haul 44,000 pounds, a tow truck that had 22,000-pound towing capacity and a massive amphibious vehicle, along with a Humvee.

It became evident by the attention of the crowd that the show was about the trucks, and we were just along for the ride and eye candy. During the event, many enlisted men and women were hovering around the trucks, many with their families. The whole idea was to "Touch a Truck," which meant children were encouraged to get up into the cabs and beds of the trucks like those their parents drive and to see what it was like. It was a great event—and our seven cars did draw quite a bit of attention.

Years ago, a show at MCRD drew about 25 show cars on a Saturday morning. The next year, after the Marine general's wife got ahold of the idea and ran with it, the show featured more than 300 cars. The "Touch A Truck" organizer said there plans to have even more trucks next year. I look forward to how we can add to the event with more of our cars.

I am so pleased that as a club we can support our military because our military men and women do, and have done, so much for us. It's only because of those who have served, are serving, or who died in service to us that we have freedoms and a lifestyle like none other in the world.

We need to remember that for many it is a volunteer service, and many did



in the US Marine Corps and served in Papua, New Guinea, as a telephone man. Next is his brother, my Uncle Alfred, who was a lieutenant in the 13th Army Air Force and flew bombing missions over Europe and the South Pacific. My other uncle, George, was training to be a medic in Basic, preparing to serve. At one time in 1943, all three of my grandparents' children were doing their part in the war effort.

Because my grandfather died before I was born, my uncles took the place of my grandfather. I spent many days and evenings with them, going on outings, i.e.

you all these stories because I haven't told anybody about these experiences."

I never heard this next story about my Dad until my uncles told me: one day, when my Dad and another Marine were rolling out a spool of telephone wire in the jungle, there was a shot—and the guy next to my Dad was shot by a sniper. I never heard if that Marine survived; only that it could have been my Dad. Living as we do in the USA, those of us who have not served in wartime can never really comprehend what war is like. We only have seen actual war footage in the news, in photos and in movies—and most re-

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not have to go. My father and uncles—and so many of our longtime members—went to the draft office to sign up. Many of you went to the draft office to sign up to serve our country, and some of you are in active service. We all are grateful for those who have served, those who are serving and for those who lost their lives in service to our country. We can never repay you for putting your lives on the line for us.

This is why Mopar Club San Diego remains committed to putting on the best All-American Car Show possible—raising funds in support of *Fleet Week San Diego* which supports our local military and their families, and for *Wounded Warrior Homes*, which provides transitional housing, resources and services to post-9/11 vets dealing with PTSD and brain injuries. Mopar Club San Diego has its gearheads, Mopar couples and families, but among those are a number of true-blue, bona fide Mopar gals who are definitely up to speed—those who own their own Mopars and show 'em, some also maintain 'em, even race 'em.


Among those at the top of the list is longtime MCSD member Kristy Keller, who owns four Mopars herself. She raced Mopars for 10 years, including at the now-defunct Carlsbad Raceway, at the LA County Raceway and in Great Bend, Kansas, and yes, she has trophies. She also was pictured in an issue of *Chrysler Power* magazine after taking first place (by .003) in the Ladies Lipton Tea Race at Palmdate one year.

Kristy is married to fellow MCSD member Jerry Keller—a longtime drag racer and Mopar afficionado in his own right—and together they have a dozen Mopars. These include the four that she owns: her 1947 Plymouth Woodie, 1998 Jeep Wrangler Sport, 2008 Viper ACR and her 2011 Dodge Limited Edition Charger. She previously owned a '64 Dart, an '88 Dodge Daytona and a '91 Stealth; the latter she later sold to Jerry, and it's still part of their Mopar dozen. "We're always wheelin' and dealin'!" Kristy laughs.

She's been a Mopar gal since she was a child, born and raised in San Diego. Her '47 Plymouth Woodie is what her parents bought in 1950, and for many years, it was "the family car." Her Dad gave the Woodie to her in 1968: "He handed me the pink slip and said to get it out of the garage or he was going to sell it . . . I love that car; it's the family heirloom."

The family lived in Old Town all her early years but moved to Pt. Loma when they lost their land to eminent domain so a portion of Interstate 5 could be built. She and her two brothers all surfed as teens, and that Woodie hauled a lot of surfboards back in the day and still carries a lot of

And it's because of the Woodie that when her first marriage ended, Kristy joined the Walter P. Chrysler Club in San Diego in 1985 and that's where she met Jerry. He'd been racing since he was 13, and he introduced Kristy to drag racing in 1988. She learned to race in Jerry's first multi-award-winning '71 Challenger, also still in the Keller car barn today. "He told me just get in the car and drive it. When the light turns green, GO!" She laughs as she adds: "I learned how to do the line lock and a burnout—and then I became a monster! I raced for 10 years."

In 1990, she and Jerry were in a street accident: their Ram was t-boned, and she suffered some soft-tissue damage in her neck, which throughout her racing career caused her pain whenever she was "trying to climb out from under the steering wheel and over the rollbar." So, in the late 90s, after a first-place win, "I said: that's it. I'm done." Then she chuckles because "in the last year or so, Jerry finally got a hinged rollbar." Followed by a laugh: "Cause he got old!"

She didn't only race, she worked on the cars, too. She restored her '47 Woodie, including going back to its original paint color and adding a new top. Oh yeah, it's still driveable. "I just put in a new starter." And she and Jerry built their current race car, the '63 Dodge Polara they raced for more than 25 years, beginning in the '90s. Now she's Jerry's helper.

Although Kristy and Jerry have been together since about 1987, they didn't get married until 2005, and that's when they moved to Ramona. It's also the year she retired after 20 years with the San Diego Public Library. Kristy has two sons from her first marriage and four grandkids. Jerry has a son and a daughter from his first marriage and a grandson.

When the Walter P. Chrysler club faded away, Kristy and Jerry joined the newly formed Mopar Muscle Club, but that, too, didn't last. Paula and Dan Smith and others started the Mopar Club of San Diego in 1993, and Kristy and Jerry can always be counted among our now-almost-30-year-old club's first members.

For sure, cars—especially Mopars—will always be a huge part of their lives. Jerry still races, they maintain all their cars (his, hers and theirs), participate in shows and always play a key role on our club's All-American Car Show's day-of-show team. And in 2014, this dynamic duo started Ramona's American Graffiti Cruise, held on Thursday nights April into September and including a car show each year, with net proceeds going to the Ramona Senior Center. Last year, these American Graffiti events raised \$20,000 for the seniors.





It was while visiting her sister that all hell broke loose one afternoon. Massive headaches and unbearable, indescribable pain resulted in an ambulance ride and a sevenday hospital stay in an unfamiliar and rather unfriendly place—with Jim back here at home. It took the docs there three days to determine she actually had a broken neck. They'd been considering massive migrane or meningitus. Jim literally made hundreds of calls: 68 in one day alone, he says, trying to get info, answers and action.

On Easter Sunday, Jim flew to Atlanta, and the next day, he brought Kay and Hemi home, where she is now relieved to be under the care of local docs.

"I'm getting better," Kay said a few days ago, "but I can't go offroading yet!" Yes, she still tires easily and will be on the mend for a while, but she is upbeat and says, "I've got the best doc right here in the house with Jim."

The Signorellis want everyone know how much "we appreciate all the good wishes, prayers and support" as Kay continues rehab, including physical therapy.

As previously reported in *The PentaGram*, Debbie was in a horrific traffic accident late last year when the van she was in was struck by another vehicle, leading to an extend-

She's now getting physical therapy and rehabbing at home—and while she still needs to go slow (always tough for a Mopar gal), she's upbeat and able to get out and about a bit at a time with a little help from her friends.

Debbie says: "Thank you, all! I love my Mopar family! I appreciate the friendships and the prayers, and I'm looking forward to being behind the wheel again." Her '68 Charger awaits!
